Wootton Community Primary School: PE and Sport Premium



What is the PE and Sport Premium?

The PE and Sport Premium is a government funding stream designed to help primary schools improve the quality of PE and sport activities they offer. Most schools with primary-age pupils receive the PE and Sport's Premium. This includes maintained schools and academies, special schools and non-maintained special schools, and pupil referral units (PRUs). The premium can be used to fund additional and sustainable improvements to the provision of PE and sport, for the benefit of primary aged pupils, to encourage the development of healthy, active lifestyles. Pupil Premium can develop or add to the PE and sport activities that Wootton already offers, or make improvements that will benefit future pupils. Wootton Community Primary School has a strong sports ethos and has achieved the Gold Schools Games Mark.

We are determined to provide a stimulating, caring and safe environment for all of our children and their families, for our staff, volunteers and governors. We strive to offer a wide range of opportunities to support and challenge the learning community at Wootton to persevere, achieve success and develop skills and attributes to encourage all to live full and rewarding lives. Sport is always an excellent vehicle to achieve this, and we believe that the Sports Premium Funding will help us to further develop. The School Games Mark is a government-led awards scheme launched in 2012 to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and in the community. Participating in this process allows schools to evaluate their PE provision and assists them in developing an action plan for future progress.

As a school, we pride ourselves on our after-school provision with clubs well-subscribed and there is a sports club held every evening. Our clubs change every half-term, and children are encouraged to re-apply each half-term so that we can ensure that every child has the opportunity to attend at least one club per half-term. We always try to enter as many of the school games competitive opportunities as possible and we strive to ensure that by the time that our pupils have reached Year 6, that every child will have represented the school in a sports event. We have a multi-skills approach to delivering our PE curriculum and have a developmental ethos to sport, but having successful teams has helped to raise the profile and value of PE both within the school and with parents. We strive to develop the wider key skills of teamwork, resilience, problem solving, communication and working with others though PE, in order to support social and emotional development. We are continuing to develop a strong sports leadership programme in Upper Key Stage 2 with our Sports Ambassadors. Sport and PE has never been stronger at Wootton Primary School, but we are always striving to develop and improve upon our offer to our children. We promote physical activity at playtimes when children can be physically active through play. Playtimes have specific sports equipment to facilitate and encourage every child to achieve the CMO guidelines of being physically active for 60 minutes in every day.

- Train new Year 6 sports ambassadors
- Purchase new play equipment and activity cards for sports ambassadors to use.
- Enter inclusive PEACH games events to engage children in new and different sporting activities.
- Aim for PEACH award status.
- Sports lead to liaise with PSHE & science leads to promote mental health across both subjects.
- Include a sports section of the newsletter to promote subject.
- A weekly PE Champion of the week to be introduced to promote the subject and its philosophies

- All pupils- year 6 pupils who take on extra responsibility within the school and the rest of the pupils who benefit from additional organized physical activity during break and lunchtimes.
- All pupils will benefit from updated and organized play equipment.

Kev indicator 3 - The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement

- New sports ambassadors will run games for all pupils until the summer term. at which point they will train current year fives to take over next academic year.
- New equipment will be split into terms, so it elongates lifespan and does not become monotonous for all sligua.
- PEACH status will promote inclusivity within the school community and will allow us to offer a wider range of inclusive sporting opportunities.
- Mental health and wellbeing will be taught in both PE and PSHE to increase awareness and importance of the topic.
