Dear Parents,

It has been another busy week in school with lots of **super learning**. I cannot believe we are already half way through this half term with just one term left of the school year! I know the teachers are really looking forward to sharing your child's progress with you at the parents' evenings so please ensure that you have signed up for an appointment.

I have enjoyed meeting with our new school council this week and well as meeting some children for **Golden Ticket**. Please return the parent questionnaire that your child should come home with as we do like to act upon your suggestions where possible, thank you.

One of the things we discussed at School Council was the need for more parent support with the **PTA** to be able to run the events the children have suggested. We are considering asking for two parent reps from each class who will attend meetings and also organise a stall at a summer event. Without this support it is unlikely that we will be able to organise future events. We will be having our next PTA meeting on **Wednesday 30th April at 6.30pm** so please come along.

In assembly on Monday we welcomed Olivia from Mountbatten Hospice who shared information about **schools' Walk the Wight**. Your child should have brought home a bookmark today and we ask that you use the QR code to register. Children can earn their miles doing activities for 30 minutes each day and do not have to take part in the 'schools part' of the walk. Some children walk further but we need them to still register with the schools part so that any money raised is counted towards Wootton's total amount. The school that raises the most money gets a prize so we are keen to raise as much as we can!

We are really looking forward to the **Easter PJs and Popcorn** event on **Thursday 3rd April**. 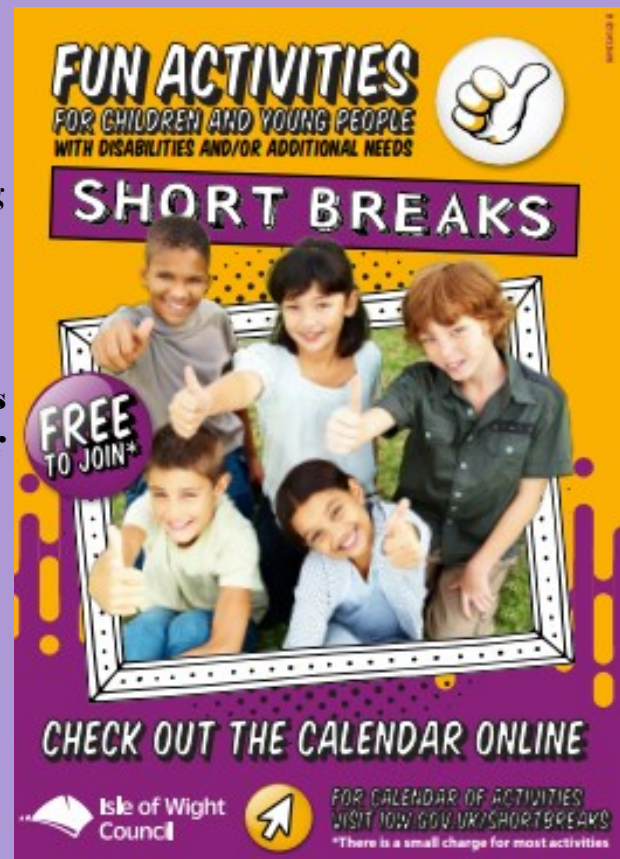

WHAT RECEPTION HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week in Reception class we started to read our new text 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We have read a few different versions of the story and have discussed the differences between each book. The children enjoyed painting beanstalks and some children made a giant door and harp in our creative area. At our topic area the children have been independently looking at the books and using the props to help them with their storytelling.

In English some of us have been writing simple sentences related to the story and they have attempted to write 'Jack climbed up the big beanstalk'.

In Maths we have been comparing numbers and identifying which number is bigger/smaller than a given number.

Outside the children created their own 'tip' where they piled up lots of our resources and then added a sign to say 'do enter'. The reason for this sign was because the children wanted the rubbish to be sorted so it could go in the ground!

Another very productive week in Reception class.

WHAT YEAR 1 HAVE BEEN UP TO

We read the story of the Three Little Pigs in English this week. The children made inferences about the character's feelings using the pictures to help and wrote sentences using 'because'. Then they practised using capital letters at the start of a sentence and for days of the week. The children edited a piece of writing and put capital letters in the correct place. Then the class wrote the story the Three Little Pigs. We are so impressed with their story writing! In Maths we solved word problems. The children thought carefully about whether they needed to add or subtract for each problem and wrote a number sentence before finding the answer. We also looked at different coins and started thinking about their value. In PSHE we learnt about taking care of the environment. We thought about what we like about different parts of the school and how we can look after our school environment. We read the story of Palm Sunday in RE. We thought about how Jesus felt in the story and did some role-play. We drew pictures to show the main events in the story. In Art we had a great time learning some clay skills - how to cut, roll and coil clay to make different shapes including coil pots. We will be designing our own pieces next week linked to our learning in English.

WHAT YEAR 2 HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week we finally got to the end of our story in English. The children were really excited and all enjoyed the ending. From the ending of the story, we learnt about possessive apostrophes. The class wrote sentences about the final scene in the book, describing what different characters were doing. The children did a great job of this and are now starting to have a good understanding of how possessive apostrophes work.

In Maths, we completed our unit of work on pictograms and started to look at money. The class has been adding and subtracting different amounts. They have done a fantastic job of this, applying these skills to real life scenarios and thinking about why it is important to have this skill.

In Computing, we have also been looking at data inputting and pictograms. This week, we went out to the sensory garden and completed a mini beast hunt. We created tally charts and then inputted our data onto the computers to create a pictogram.

In Science, we looked at the germination sequence. We explored the progress of a seed growing into a plant. The whole class then participated in some more gardening and did a great job of digging over the wildflower bed.

Another brilliant week! Thank you!

WHAT YEAR 3 HAVE BEEN UP TO

A busy week in Year 3 has led to some exciting events. In English we finished up our recount writing and have moved onto persuasive letter writing. The class has recapped their understanding of persuasive devices and applied that learning to an identification task. In Maths, we have focused on fractions - adding, subtracting, partitioning and problem solving. In Computing, we have started creating our Roman poster using Google Docs and the children have practiced creating and placing text boxes as well as recapping how to add, edit and resize text. In Music, their recorder lessons continued in style and in PE swimming continues to go from strength to strength. My highlight of the week was science. This week, the children concluded their investigations into the essentials for plant growth and were able to conclude that cress can grow without soil, sunlight and air but will not grow without water. I was impressed with how many of the class were brave enough to eat some of their plants too! Finally, I need to give a shout out to Patryk for volunteering to share his experiences with the Short Breaks and his Young Inspector role. We were treated to a wonderful workshop where we found out lots about his role, the organisation and the children were even treated to some goodies. Well done Patryk - thank you for sharing!



WHAT YEAR 4 HAVE BEEN UP TO

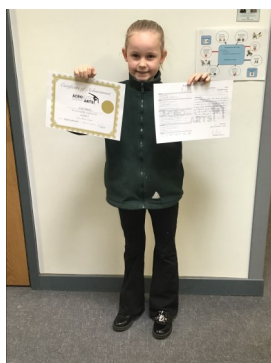
This week in English, we have been working on writing poetry inspired by the journey of a river. The children have been learning how to use adverbs, prepositions, and figurative language to bring their poems to life. They have created some wonderful descriptions of flowing waters, and tumbling waterfalls!

In Maths, we have been focusing on using formal methods for addition and subtraction. Some children have found subtraction tricky, particularly with exchanging, but I have been incredibly impressed by their perseverance and determination to improve their skills.

In Geography, we have been learning about meanders and how they shape the landscape through erosion and deposition. The children have explored how rivers carve out their paths over time, changing the land around them. Finally, in PSHE, we have been learning about children's rights and what this looks like in our country. We have had thoughtful discussions about fairness, responsibility, and how we can ensure everyone's rights are respected. Well done Year 4!

WHAT YEAR 5 HAVE BEEN UP TO

Another good week in Year 5! In English, the children have been using precise vocabulary and expanded noun phrases to describe a 1st person encounter with a yellow-spotted lizard. We talked in depth about the effect of our word choices and whether they would paint a strong image in the reader's head. Maths has been quite tricky this week, with the class learning how to multiply both unit and non-unit fractions by whole numbers. Once this was secure, the children moved onto finding fractions of amounts, a concept which requires quick recall of division facts (why it is so important that they know their times tables!) In Science, Year 5 have been exploring life cycles of mammals which sparked some interesting questions, and in computing, they have been creating flat-file databases. History this week saw the children design their own Mayan God and then they used this within art to begin to draw a Mayan inspired mask. These are looking great so far, I can't wait to see the finished products in a few weeks!

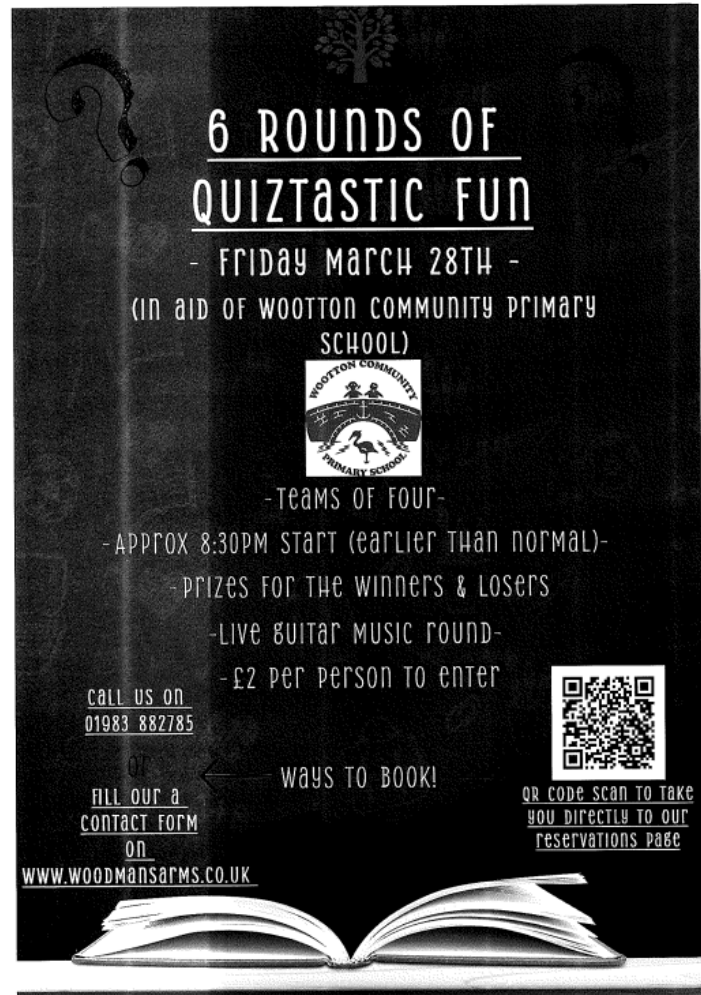
