WHAT RECEPTION HAVE BEEN UP TO

We have had a brilliant week in Reception class. We have continued to introduce new routines and the children are now confidently getting themselves ready at home time plus they are looking carefully for their name on their sticker charts when they receive a sticker!

This week all the children had a go at writing their names that will be displayed in class along with their portraits. Each half term the children will write their names again and we can see the fantastic progress they make.

We have also started the online Baseline assessment that the Government sets as well as starting the Christmas Cauliflower card designs

WHAT YEAR 1 HAVE BEEN UP TO

We have had another fun week in Year One! We have been writing a class story in English this week, all about Mrs Wilford trying to find a quiet place to work! The children used the book *Peace at Last* as their inspiration and all wrote a page for the story. They had some great ideas and used their phonics to write words and short sentences.

In Maths, we have been finding one more and one less. We also continued our work on number formation.

In Science this week we started our work on the 5 senses. We listened to a song to help us remember the 5 senses then we focused on the sense of hearing. We went on a listening walk around the school and the children drew all of the different sounds they could hear.

In Music, we listened to some hip hop music. The children really enjoyed this and had a good dance along! We then played our instruments along to our song, keeping a steady pulse.

In Art, we designed puppets that we will be working towards creating over the next couple of weeks. We had some lovely and very unique ideas and are very much looking forward to trying to make them soon.

A fantastic week! Well done Year 1!

WHAT YEAR 2 HAVE BEEN UP TO

Year 2 have been very busy with their learning this week. In English, the children made Traction Man's latest villain come to life through their character descriptions.

The class finished the week by editing their work to ensure they had included capital letters for their proper nouns and included powerful adjectives to create some very impressive expanded noun phrases. The class then shared their work aloud, and we had a vote for the scariest, funniest and silliest villains! In Maths, the class have been comparing numbers using the more than >, less than <, and equal to = symbols. For some of the children, a recap of our tens and ones was needed, but once secure, the class were flying through their tasks confidently. In RE, the children have been focused on places that are special to them, and how they may feel if it was destroyed. They were then asked how they would feel if someone else's special place was destroyed, and it was wonderful to hear their humble responses of how they would be wanting to share their place with others. The highlight of the week was Art and creating our designs for our cauliflower cards. They look amazing and I am excited for you to see them, however, a few of your children may be excited for 'C-mas' 3 months too soon! Have a fab weekend all.

WHAT YEAR 3 HAVE BEEN UP TO

Despite the wild weather, the children have shown true grit and spirit and have produced wonderful work. In English, we have used our knowledge of the class text to write wonderful diary entries from the perspective of Sophie entitled 'Day one with the giant'. The children also focused on using adverbs to make their writing more interesting. In maths, we have been exploring the concept of money. We have recapped what coins and notes we use in the UK and also recapped key facts including - how many pennies make one pound. During this unit, the children have learned how to add, subtract and convert between pounds and pence and have begun to answer problem solving questions involving money. In geography, the children explored the terms, urban and rural and explored what makes London urban. In computing, the children designed their own digital devices by using their understanding of inputs and outputs to help. My highlight of the week was science. The children worked well in groups investigating which everyday objects in our classroom are transparent, translucent and opaque.

WHAT YEAR 4 HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week in year 4, we began our printing project in art, linked to our Anglo-Saxons topic. We will be designing and printing 'illuminated letters' - the decorative initial letters used at the beginning of scrolls and historic manuscripts. As a first step, the children experimented with leaf printing, using both ready mixed paints and watercolours. They applied the paint as either single or multi-colour using brushes, rollers and sponges in order to see the different effects. In English, the children have edited and published their character descriptions. We are now moving on to look at the rules of direct speech in preparation to write a short narrative. In maths, we are tackling the often tricky concept of rounding numbers! Rounding is such a useful skill which will help the children use estimation to check their calculations when using the 4 basic mathematical operations.

WHAT YEAR 5 HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week, in English, the children have written setting descriptions about the island Michael washes up on. They have explored how to paint a picture in readers' heads, using features such as similes and metaphors. In Maths, the children have been focusing on rounding whole numbers within 1,000,000. Whilst this topic has been slightly tricky for some, I am very impressed by their perseverance to keep trying and their understanding is continuing to progress. Within Science this week, we completed a properties of materials investigation, testing a range of materials for transparency, magnetism and electrical conductivity. The children compared results between their initial predictions and final observations, and discussed why there were some anomalies. Geography saw the class learning how to use 4 and 6-figure grid references to locate areas on a map and we explored the differences between varying search engines in Computing. Keep up the good work Year 5!

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

SNAPCHAT

AGE RESTRICTION
13+

With over 300 million active monthly users and billions of 'snaps' sent each month, Snapchat is a popular messaging app among children and young people. It allows users to share fun, spontaneous pictures and videos with friends and family while using playful filters. One of Snapchat's unique features is that pictures, videos and messages are only viewable for a short period of time.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Snapchat's use of artificial intelligence (AI) includes features like the 'My AI' chatbot and AI-powered filters, offering interactive experiences that can be fun but also pose risks. These tools may share unfiltered or inaccurate responses, promote unrealistic beauty standards, and collect personal data. Advanced filters and display-style lenses can distort reality, potentially leading to manipulation, impersonation, or inappropriate content.

SCREEN ADDICTION

Snapchat boosts user engagement and daily use with features like streaks (daily Snapchat exchanges between you and a friend). When a streak's been going for a few days, users will see a 🔥 emoji. The number alongside it shows the number of days, but if users miss a day and break the streak, the only way to restore it is to pay. This encourages daily use habits, and frequent notifications can keep users returning to the app even more often.

SEXTORTION

Because Snapchat's disappearing messages feature may foster a sense of safety, users may become targets of extortion. For example, a predator may pressure someone into sending nude images, then threaten to share those images to threaten and intimidate the victim. This might involve claiming they will share the images with friends or family unless money is paid.

SNAPCHAT+

Snapchat+ is the platform's premium subscription service, offering early access to new and exclusive features. In June 2023, Snapchat introduced a new tier called Lens+, giving subscribers access to hundreds of lenses and AR experiences for playing, creating, and sharing designs. These paid features may encourage young users to spend money to access exclusive content, increasing the risk of overspending or feeling pressured to make in-app purchases.

ACCESSIBILITY

Snapchat is now accessible from a web browser, meaning children can use it on a laptop or tablet without downloading the app. This can make activity harder to monitor, reduce the effectiveness of parental controls, and increase the risk of unsupervised communication or exposure to inappropriate content.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some content on Snapchat isn't suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so even an innocent search term could still yield age-inappropriate results. The app's disappearing messages feature also makes it easy for young people to share explicit images or messages – as sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat.

Advice for Parents & Educators

ACCESS THE SNAPCHAT FAMILY SAFETY HUB

Controlled with guidance from Common Sense Media, Snapchat has developed a Family Safety Hub that explains how the app works and how to use its in-app protections for teens. It's essential that you review this guidance before allowing a child to download Snapchat. Remember, this app is only intended for children aged 13 and over.

BLOCK AND REPORT

If a stranger connects with a child on Snapchat and makes them feel uncomfortable by pressuring them to send or receive unwanted or inappropriate images, the child can tap the three dots on that person's profile to report or block them. There are options to state why they're reporting that user, with a tailored reporting section under the 'Nude and Sexual Content' category. In this category, there's the option to report somebody for threatening to leak sexually explicit images, or 'nude'.

ENCOURAGE OPEN DISCUSSIONS

Snapchat's risks can be easier to handle if you nurture an open dialogue. Talk about sexting and blackmail before letting children sign up. If they're faced with a scam, encourage them to tell you immediately. Talk openly and non-judgmentally about sexting, emphasising its inherent risks. Furthermore, explain how popular 'cheat bangs' on the platform can have harmful consequences.

USE PRIVACY SETTINGS TOGETHER

It's down with the children in your care and explore Snapchat's privacy settings as a shared activity. You can help them adjust who can contact them, view their stories, or see their location on Snap Map. It's a good opportunity to explain why some settings are safer than others, reinforcing their understanding of online boundaries. Encourage them to regularly review these settings, especially after app updates or changes in their friendship groups.
