Dear Parents/Carers,

Another very busy week and it was wonderful to see two of our ex-pupils return yesterday from **Lift Ryde**, Matthew and Evan, to speak to our Year 6 about their new school and the transition from Primary to Secondary.

Talking of Secondary, our Year 6 and half of Year 5, with the remaining half next week, have a wonderful opportunity to complete a **Science lesson** at Lift Ryde, thank you to the staff for supporting with this.

Another highlight of the week has been the **planetarium space dome** visit for Reception and Year 1 and listening after to the children talking all about what they had found out. Several of the Reception boys were so excited they came to tell me all about going to space, with George F explaining about the craters found on the moon.

Our Year 5 class worked with staff from **MHST** this week exploring how anxiety can impact our lives and looked at a range of strategies to help them if they are ever struggling with worries. We have some sessions during the year for other classes exploring a range of issues.

Next Friday School Council would like to support Mount Batten **'Go Yellow Day.'** Children can wear a yellow accessory to school WITH their school uniform for a donation along with guessing the name of a yellow toy. I am sure most of us have been impacted by the incredible work that the hospice provides so I really hope we can raise lots of money for them next Friday, thank you.

We are looking forward to welcoming **two authors** to school next Thursday and Friday as part of the Isle of Wight Literary Festival. Holly Webb will be visiting years 1 and 2 to share her inspiration for her stories and complete a short creative activity, and Peter Murray will be visiting years 5 and 6 to share his writing process and his latest book based on the myths and legends of the island of Jersey.

I am enjoying meeting with groups of children from Years 1 to 6 to complete our pupil conference scheme **'Golden Ticket'**. Children are selected each week and have the opportunity to share their work and talk about their school experiences - good and bad! When your child receives a Golden Ticket they should bring home a questionnaire for you to complete. This is a really good opportunity for you to share your thoughts and I really encourage you to complete this and return to school, thank you.

On Monday 13th October years 1 to 6 will be walking to St Marks church for our **Harvest service**. Unfortunately we do not have space for parents to come and watch, however if you are able to offer your time to walk there and back with us you can stay for the service. Our **top 5 homework achievers** are shared on the newsletter each week; the children can then add their 5 House Points when they come back to school on Monday.

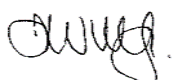

WHAT RECEPTION HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week in Reception class we have focused on number formation looking particularly at numbers 0, 1 and 2. We have also been singing number songs and during carpet sessions we have done lots of counting — starting and finishing on different numbers with an emphasis on saying the 'teen' numbers correctly.

We have continued to carry out the maths element of the Government Baseline assessment and that is now complete.

We have been learning about Autumn and have been talking about how we know its Autumn, and learning about evergreen and deciduous trees! In the art area the children have been creating their own Autumn pictures using their finger tips to make the leaves.

A wonderful week with lots of focused learning. Well done Reception class.

WHAT YEAR 1 HAVE BEEN UP TO

In English this week we practised joining words using 'and', as well as writing sentences using full stops. We talked about why full stops are so important and found lots of full stops in books.

In Maths we learnt the vocabulary greater/fewer. We used the symbols $<$ $>$ and $=$ to compare numbers.

The children enjoyed our Science lesson this week, learning about the sense of smell. The children smelled some different pots and guessed what was inside each pot. They made some great guesses!

In Geography we watched some drone footage of the school, the children found it very exciting looking at the different parts of our school. They then drew their own maps of the school.

On Thursday we got to visit the Space Dome. The children really enjoyed this experience and we were amazed by some of the knowledge and questions the children had. We got to see lots of different star constellations and learn how to spot them in the night sky. We also pretended to be in a rocket and fly through space.

Another fun-filled week, with some fantastic work from all the children! Well done Year 1!

WHAT YEAR 2 HAVE BEEN UP TO

It was lovely to see so many children return to school this week after having chickenpox - welcome back!

In maths, we have been partitioning numbers up to 20 using Numicon, bar models, and part-whole models.

In writing, the children completed their toy adverts, showing off their expanded noun phrases, proper noun capitalisation, and use of conjunctions.

In science, we tested different materials to find the best one for Traction Man's tent, and in computing, we talked about how to use information technology safely and why rules are important.

We have also been practising our Harvest song in music ready to perform at the church in a couple of weeks. Another fab week Year 2!

WHAT YEAR 3 HAVE BEEN UP TO

What a creative week we've had. In English, the children have been learning how to write and perform acrostic poems. They have explored alliteration and performance techniques to enhance their BFG inspired poems. In maths, we have spent the week exploring addition. The children have been practising using the place value method to solve up to 3 by 3 digit addition calculations with exchanges. The creativity does not stop there though: in science the children investigated how and why shadows change shape, using torches and toys to explore what happens when a light source gets closer to or further from an opaque object. In geography, the children created advertising posters for London to show their understanding of human and physical features.



WHAT YEAR 4 HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week, the children had the opportunity to show off the writing skills that they have learnt so far during year 4. They chose an image to inspire their own suspense narratives featuring rich vocabulary, expanded nouns phrases, prepositions, direct speech and fronted adverbials. I was really impressed with their focus and writing stamina. We have so many budding bestselling authors! In maths, we have been decomposing the numbers 100 and 1000 using related facts. We are now moving onto addition and subtraction in the context of money, including multi-step problems. In history, we used Venn diagrams to compare and contrast the beliefs of Romans and Anglo-Saxons. We have been learning about the infrastructure behind the Internet in computing. This week, the children explored the school website, paying attention to the hyperlinks and navigation menus that allow people to quickly find the information that they need. The children even designed homepages for their favourite animals and hobbies! In music, we began a unit of work featuring Electronic Dance Music (EDM). The song we played (and particularly the vocals!) attracted mixed opinions, but most of the children agreed that the music gave them the urge to move their bodies! In future lessons, we will look at the song's musical notation. Overall, a great week in year 4!

WHAT YEAR 5 HAVE BEEN UP TO

In English this week, the children have explored both Haiku and Kenning poetry. They have enjoyed looking at these different forms of writing and having a go at creating some for themselves. I have been extremely impressed by their fantastic use of language within their poems! During maths, we have been using our understanding of inverse operations to solve addition and subtraction word problems, first scanning the question for key information and then identifying which operation to use to find the answer. This learning has focused on children showing all of their working out in a clear, step-by-step way. In science this week, the children have made predictions about which methods (picking out by hand, decanting, filtering, sieving, evaporating or using a magnet) they think will be best to separate different mixtures from each other. The children thought carefully about why they were choosing each method and are keen to see whether they prove their predictions correct! In art, the children used their creativity to explore collage techniques that they might use for their final pieces of Hokusai's Great Wave, and in computing, they created their own webpage. We also had a great mental health workshop, which was very beneficial to the children, and finally the first half of the class enjoyed their visit to Lift Ryde. Super week, well done Year 5!

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AN ANNUAL RELEASE SCHEDULE

As was the case with the last two EA Sports FC games and the FIFA series before it, the franchise rolls out once a year with updated squads and new features. This can make it expensive to keep up with, particularly when so many dedicated players are keen to get their hands on the latest edition.

VOICE CHAT

Voice chat can be enabled across all platforms, meaning young people can speak to anyone they play with or against. While it can be switched off, some children will no doubt want to speak to their friends while they play. This also means they may encounter strangers much older than them, which can expose them to inappropriate language or behaviour.

IN-GAME PURCHASES THROUGH ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Team is the big draw for EA Sports FC, letting players spend real money on packs that they can open to build a squad of the world's best players. They're not always easy to obtain, and new, improved versions of players will be regularly added on limited-time offerings. Young people could feel pressured into spending money and experience fear of missing out.

SCAMMERS IN ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Team is managed by EA itself, but that hasn't stopped scammers from looking to dupes players out of money and in-game coins. Some scammers will offer services, which is a violation of EA's terms of service, while others will 'help' coins – something the developer is still working to crack down on. Some try to gain access to others' accounts, potentially giving them access to payment information.

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

While EA Sports FC is potentially addictive, thanks to its fast-paced gameplay and mirroring of the real-world skill and glamour of football, Ultimate Team's focus on limited-time rewards and the luxury of winning packs can make it feel closer to gambling than gaming, which may lead to addiction and impulsive spending of money.

Advice for Parents & Educators

PREPARE FOR ANOTHER GAME IN A YEAR

The annual-release calendar aligns with the return of the school year, and can be a great way to incentivise good behaviour at the start of term. If children are applying themselves and preparing for a new year of school, or were particularly well behaved in the summer, EA Sports FC 26 could make a great reward.

LIMIT SPENDING

If you're worried about children accidentally spending real money in Ultimate Team, whether in game or on the EA Sports FC companion app, don't link a payment card to their account. Replenishing funds can be a mountain to climb, and the dopamine hit of opening flashy packs with elite minutes means one purchase can lead to another very quickly. It's also worth asking a prepaid card if you'd prefer them to make their own choices with their budget.

MONITOR VOICE CHAT

As in-game chat is open, be sure to adjust the settings in EA Sports FC 26 to lock it down. If children want to chat with their friends while they play, consider setting up a safe space for them to do, to allow them to play without fear of outsiders.

BE VIGILANT

As with last year, there are ways to keep scammers at bay. Ensure passwords are locked down, and consider using a password manager application to keep them secure. EA will never contact players through the game itself, so be vigilant with incoming messages, and block and report suspected spam. EA will contact players by email if needed, but they will never ask for usernames or passwords. Players should also avoid buying in-game currency from unofficial resellers – doing so can lead to accounts being banned and could cost players money in the process.

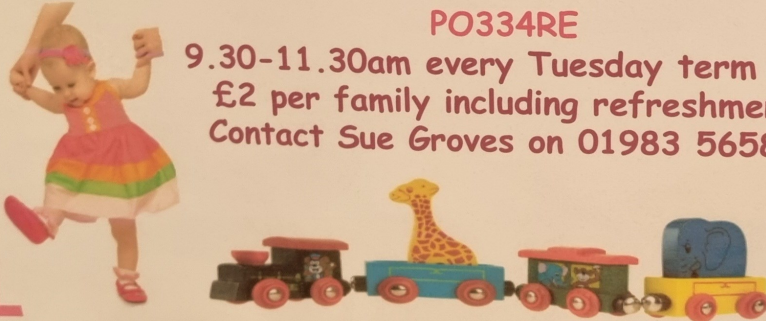
