It was so lovely to work with families at the **Mardi Gras workshops** last Saturday, thank you to all the parents who attended and for all the help. Children signed up for the Mardi Gras should have brought home a letter this week regarding the arrangements on the day, please ensure that this is returned.

Year 1 had a fantastic day at the **Wildheart Animal Sanctuary** on Monday and engaged so well with all the activities. Don't forget **NEXT FRIDAY** we are supporting their fundraising events by brining a teddy to school for a donation of at least £1. We have also sent home a word search and competition for the children to complete and return to school if they want to enter the sanctuary's competition.

Last week we completed a **writing moderation assessment** with the Local Authority and received excellent feedback. They were really impressed with the writing standards of our Year 6 class and could also clearly see much evidence of our school improvement focus areas; spelling and the use of technical language.

We have been able to sort out which classes teachers will be teaching in September but cannot finalise support staff until we have completed our recruitment process. We will be changing class names which the children will explore in their transition day on **Tuesday 7th July** when you will also get the chance to come along at 8.45am to meet your child's new teacher. In the meantime classes will be taught by:
Reception: Mrs Cowell, **Year 1:** Mrs Deakin (Monday to Wednesday) and Mrs Ball (Thursday and Friday), **Year 2:** Miss Cooke, **Year 3:** Mr Scurr, **Year 4:** Mrs Hanson, **Year 5:** Ms White and **Year 6:** Miss Adams.

We have had the absolute privilege of watching our incredible **young carers** lead two assemblies this week. These children have been working with Mrs Harrison over the last few weeks to prepare information for an assembly that explains what a young carer is and how this impacts them. Young carers have a sibling or parent at home with a long term medical condition or poor mental health that requires support from their child. This often prevents the child also being to attend events/places due to this need and they often miss out. Our young carers meet fortnightly to support each other and have the opportunity to share any worries, understanding that there are many other children in the same situation as them. The assemblies were amazing and we are so proud of them all.

It was a super **Celebration Assembly** today hearing all the wonderful progress children have made as well as the different achievements children are gaining outside of school. Congratulations to: Florence in Reception and Betty in Year 4 for their swimming certificates; Luca, Jasper and Leo in Year 2 shared their football medals and trophies they received at a football presentation; Tilly in Year 2 with Lara and Pippa in Year 4 shared their gym fit Bronze award certificates; Maverick in Year 1 and his brother Phoenix in Year 3 showed us their Corf scout camp mugs from a recent camping adventure and Lauren and George C in Reception shared their football awards. We also heard from Hayley in Year 6 who represented the IW athletics team in Winchester last weekend and gained 3 personal bests along with coming 1st place in the 75m sprint - we will need to keep a watch out for her in future years Olympics! Well done, everyone.

We continue to congratulate children with their **reading achievements** at home. We presented four Bronze, one Gold, One Platinum and one Diamond award certificate today. Fantastic work everyone!

WHAT RECEPTION HAVE BEEN UP TO

We have had a very busy week in Reception class and we have continued to learn new daily facts about different dinosaurs. We want to ensure this information is really being retained so each day after lunch we have a quick recap to see who can remember a fact or two! This information has also fed into our writing and the children have been working with me on a 1:1 basis to write some simple facts.

In maths we have continued with the recall of the number bonds and have been jumping between numbers to ensure the children really know them!

The children have enjoyed playing in the outside tough tray this week as Miss Shephard froze some little dinosaurs inside balloons and the children used little hammers to break the ice and free the dinosaurs. Not only was it lots of fun but it also helped to develop the children's arm strength.

The children have been busy making little frames with self-portraits in to give to their dads, uncles or grandads.

WHAT YEAR 1 HAVE BEEN UP TO

We had a fantastic day at Wildheart Animal Sanctuary! We saw monkeys, lions, pigs, tigers and lemurs but the children particularly enjoyed seeing the bears! We saw the bears running and playing with each other in the water. The children learned lots of new information about the different animals. We were so proud of the whole class for their fantastic listening and engagement on the visit!

In Maths this week we worked on number bonds to 20. The children used their knowledge of number bonds to ten to help them find bonds to twenty. They showed the number bonds using numicon and wrote number sentences.

In English, the children wrote all of the main events in the story. They used time words such as first, next and then. On Thursday, the class took part in some drama. We pretended to be Queen Victoria and acted out the story. We then wrote a diary, making sure we included the time words we'd practiced on Wednesday.

In Science we started our new topic about plants. The children looked at plants around the school and learned about the different parts of a plant. They drew and labelled a detailed picture of a plant.

We continued our DT on free standing structures. This week we focused on what happens as a structure gets taller. We learnt some methods of stabilising structures and tried these out. The class had a great time and built some very magnificent towers!

A brilliant week Year 1! Well done!

WHAT YEAR 2 HAVE BEEN UP TO

A very productive and fun week in Year 2 this week!

In Maths we have been working on statistics and data, securing our knowledge of reading and creating tally charts, pictograms and block diagrams. In English we have been exploring inference, what it means and identifying elements in our class text *Fantastic Mr Fox*. The children have also been explaining the actions of Mr Fox using the conjunctions *because* and *so*, to create sentences of their own. Malaysia continues to be our focus in Geography as we identified the human and physical features of Kota Kinabalu and compared them to the features of the Isle of Wight. In Art, we have been revisiting last week's examples of Malaysian batik art and studying the repetitive patterns. We then recreated some of these prints using leaves, paint and chalk which the class thoroughly enjoyed!

In PSHE we discussed the benefits and risks of the internet which is a topic that always generates rich class discussion. Year 2 understood that not everything we see on the internet is true, and we need to take extra care when using it. Overall, a great week. Thanks again Year 2!

WHAT YEAR 3 HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week I'll start with my highlight which is DT. The children have worked incredibly hard on their papier-mâché Roman Shields. They have been creating a glue-like paste, tearing newspaper, creating a 'boss' (ball on the front) and then covering a top layer. The shields look fantastic and I cannot wait for our parent share event next Wednesday to see them painted. In English, we have focused on direct speech - recapping our understanding of speech rules and then applying that knowledge by writing a conversation based on two of the characters in our class text - Boudica's Army. Speaking of Boudica, in history, we explored the Iceni Queen herself and learned how and why she revolted against the romans as well as exploring her failed military exploits. In maths, we focused on subtraction this week, learning how to use the column method to solve a variety of calculation types. In the wider curriculum, we enjoyed a science afternoon on Wednesday. During that session, we tried to answer the question - Does having longer legs mean you'll jump further? This was a wonderful session full of thought-provoking questions and detailed investigations. In computing, the children were introduced to Google Docs and learned how to select a font type, size and how to insert images.

WHAT YEAR 4 HAVE BEEN UP TO

This week in English, the children have edited and published their Gorm character descriptions. They are full of fabulous, descriptive vocabulary and have been presented beautifully. Well done year 4! In maths, we finished our unit on fractions by converting between mixed numbers and improper fractions, before revisiting tenths and hundredths as decimals. On Thursday, we took the opportunity to link our science day enquiry with some maths work, by presenting data using numbers with up to 2 decimal places as a scatter diagram. We investigated whether the length of the children's femurs had any relationship with the distance they could jump. We concluded that there was no direct relationship between the two measures and that this was far easier to determine from our diagrams than our data collection tables. In RE, we discussed the times when people might look to God for comfort and support. In geography, we used OS maps to identify areas of high land around the Island, before comparing the land use on Brading, Mottistone and Tennyson Downs. Wishing everyone a happy weekend!

WHAT YEAR 5 HAVE BEEN UP TO

A great week in Year 5! In English, the children have written diary entries from the point of view of Carter and Sadie recounting the events of the big explosion! I have been extremely impressed by their focus and effort during our writing this week, which has led to some superb reads. Within maths, we have recapped our understanding of short division and consolidated the method so we can answer a range of different questions. Many of the children have grown in confidence with this and it is great to see their resilience pay off. We had an exciting science afternoon on Wednesday where we completed an investigation into whether exercise has an impact on our mood and concentration. Computing saw the children create eye catching adverts for a local business, whilst we extended our knowledge of Egyptian Pharaohs in history. Our sailing session was fantastic this week, with the children out on the water for a long period of time enjoying themselves! Well done Year 5 ☺
